Music Development Plan Summary: Brockwell Junior School

At Brockwell Junior School, music is viewed as an opportunity for children to express themselves and their feelings through the use of voice and instruments. Our Music curriculum aims to give every child the opportunity to sing, listen, compose and perform. They explore, play and learn a range of musical instruments as well as developing their use of voice and rhythm.

Music provision reflects the schools underpinning motto of 'Safe, Smile, Succeed', providing experiences that children enjoy and succeed in. It provides a framework and a set of skills which all teaching staff can use to seek guidance on planning, teaching and assessing Music.

This is a summary of how our school delivers music education to ALL our pupils across three areas – curriculum music, co-curricular provision and musical experiences – and what changes we are planning in future years.

This information sets out how Brockwell Junior School delivers high-quality music provision in curriculum music, co-curricular music and musical experiences, taking into account the key features in the <u>national plan for music education</u>:

Part A: Curriculum music

This is about what we teach in lesson time, how much time is spent teaching music and any music qualifications or awards that pupils can achieve.

Children experience an hour of curriculum music provision per week for 15 weeks during instrumental music lessons of which they are provided with a range from ukulele, toots, samba, steel pans, hand bells and P-bones. They have weekly lessons of an hour during the other weeks using Charanga and Young Voices materials. In the term including a class performance to a live audience, the sessions may be blocked rather than separated by the week.

Our curriculum is well informed by the <u>model music curriculum</u> (March 2021), non-statutory guidance for teaching music from Key Stages 1 to 3 and has been developed in consultation with our Hub partners.

All pupils in years 3, 5 and usually 6 learn to play an instrument during lesson time through whole-class ensemble teaching.

Whole school music from Ten Pieces (focusing on appraisal and musicians) is delivered during music assembly during the spring terms.

North East Derbyshire Hub for Music is a key partner organisation.

Part B: Co-curricular music

This is about opportunities for pupils to sing and play music, outside of lesson time, including choirs, ensembles and bands, and how pupils can make progress in music beyond the core curriculum.

Outside of what is taught in lesson time, one-to-one, small-group and large-group tuition for instruments is available on request by parents. If financial hardship would be a barrier, subsidies are available to ensure fair access.

We have a dedicated room – The Hub – available to music teachers from the NEDMC to deliver sessions across the school week.

Our school choir runs through the autumn in preparation for a live performance at Sheffield Arena – Young Voices and includes all of year 5 children.

Further music-making and singing is planned when the class is due to perform for parents as part of our enrichment calendar.

We signpost children to choirs and music activities out of school through newsletters.

We get regular updates from the NEDMC partnership to support co-curricular music too.

Part C: Musical experiences

This is about all the other musical events and opportunities that we organise, such as singing in assembly, concerts and shows, and trips to professional concerts.

Musical experiences are planned for the academic year, including regular events such as singing in assembly every week, musical performances following Wider Opportunities, a Christmas, whole school concerts and class assemblies.

All Year Five children learn the lyrics and music ready to perform live at Sheffield Arena in Young Voices annually. This gives every child the opportunity to both perform and experience live music by known, accomplished artists across a range of musical aspects.

During the key stage, children experience musical theatre by visiting the local theatre in term time. All children attend regardless of voluntary contributions made.

During assemblies, our music teachers inspire children through performing to the children live.

At the end of term, children learning an individual instrument perform for the school and their parents.
